



Pageviews by Website & Year (last 5 years)

Minimum Wage

Launched: Mar. 31, 2016

Our 55th website explores the pros and cons in the debate over increasing the minimum wage. The federal minimum wage was introduced in the 1930s by President Roosevelt and has been increased by Congress 22 times, most recently in 2009 to reach its current level of \$7.25 an hour.

Proponents say the current federal minimum wage is too low for anyone to live on; and that a higher minimum wage will help create jobs, grow the economy, and decrease wage inequality.

Opponents say that many businesses cannot afford to pay their workers more and will be forced to close, lay off workers, and reduce hiring; that an increase makes it more difficult for low-skilled workers with little or no experience to find jobs; and that low-income communities are disproportionately harmed by wage raises at the federal level.



The number of schools in which an educator has used ProCon.org grew from 7,026 schools at the end of 2015 to 8,837 schools at the end of 2015 - an increase of 1,811 schools (26%). We add schools to our list when we see that an educator (not a student) from that school has referenced ProCon.org online, usually in a lesson plan, suggested resources list, social media reference to our content, published work, or as a response to our two-minute ProCon.org teacher/librarian survey.

The breakdown of schools by level is as follows: 2,731 elementary and middle schools (30.9%), 4,334 high schools (49.0%), and 1,772 colleges and universities (20.1%).

PROCON.ORG TEACHER SURVEY

We ran a [ProCon.org Teacher Survey](#) to receive input from teachers and librarians so we could understand how they use ProCon.org and to learn their views on whether or not using ProCon.org improves their students' critical thinking skills. The survey had 856 respondents between Jan. 1, 2016 and Dec. 31, 2016. Some highlights from that survey include:


-  98.7% of teachers using ProCon.org reported that ProCon.org improved their students' critical thinking skills.
-  99.8% of teachers using ProCon.org reported that their students found ProCon.org useful.
-  100% of respondents said they would recommend ProCon.org to teachers or librarians


It was our seventh year in a row with all indicators of success over 96%.


MEDIA & PROCON.ORG


ProCon.org received 618 media references in 2016, compared to 514 in 2015.

Notable 2015 media references included *USA Today*, *Forbes*, *New York Times*, *Edweek*, *Los Angeles Times*, *Yahoo! News*, *The Atlantic*, and *International Business Times*.

 On Nov. 17, 2016, *Reno News and Review* wrote: "To help citizens keep track of the new president's record, ProCon.org is a 501c3 nonprofit educational site. Its CEO, Kamy Akhavan, said, 'We have spent the last year finding Donald Trump's statements on 75 policy issues from death penalty (pro) and same-sex marriage (con) to fracking (pro) and oil company subsidies (con) to medical marijuana (pro) and closing Guantanamo (con). Our staff of professional researchers have scoured articles, speeches, interviews, transcripts, you name it.'"


 *The Inquisitr* wrote on Nov. 5, 2016: "If any American voter is still feeling confused and conflicted, know you are definitely not alone in feeling this way, and check out an online site which might help in making the big decision before Tuesday, November 8: ProCon 2016 election website. They have designed a quiz about the big four presidential candidates and the controversial issues voters are talking about this year."


 On Nov. 2, 2016, *Ziptopia* wrote: "ProCon.org offers thorough, two-sided arguments on a variety of contentious topics. Looking through 'Issues We Cover' will provide you with pros and cons, so you'll be well-versed next time someone brings up something like the Trans-Pacific Partnership. The site is encyclopedic in its coverage and is a great place to research for the 2016 presidential election."

 On Oct. 19, 2016, *Houma Today* wrote: "Rather than relying on the word and arguments of those who have already made up their minds, you might find it more useful to seek out objective discussions about the two candidates and their stated positions."

This can be done in a number of places, but one website that offers a clear and easy-to-follow chart is 2016election.procon.org. The website's policy position chart includes the stated stances of Clinton and Trump, as well as those of third-party candidates Gary Johnson, a Libertarian, and Jill Stein, from the Green Party.

The chart includes links to each candidate's statements on each issue. If you have not yet made up your mind, or if you want more information about your own candidate, the chart is a good place to start."

 *The Daily News Journal* (part of the *USA Today* network), on Mar. 20, 2016, stated: "Today, with presidential campaigns in full bloom, we want to talk about the political environment, its impact on our domestic world and the family life of our teens... Your conversation might benefit from several resources: ProCon is a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization that relates all sides of more than 50 issues."

 The Mar. 2016 issue of *Social Education* included praise from C. Frederick Risinger: "This is an absolutely 'must have' site in every teacher's bookmark/favorites list... It has a great 'Teacher's Corner,' with free lesson plans, a section on how teachers can meet Common Core and NCSS standards as they use the Pro-Con materials, and a section on teaching controversial issues and critical thinking... I bragged about this site in my last column, but it is so perfect for this topic."



BOARD & STAFF

In 2016 ProCon.org had six full time staff members, three part-time employees, and nine unpaid Board members. We had also had two interns and three volunteers contributing roughly 200 hours of volunteer time all together. Staff members included one Senior Researcher/Associate Editor, one Senior Researcher, one Researcher, one Associate Researcher, one School Outreach Coordinator, one IT Director, one Director of Development, one President/Managing Editor (who became our incoming CEO), and one outgoing CEO (who remains a Board member).

Nov. 2016

Thanks primarily to our 2016 election website, ProCon.org received 3.9 million visitors in November--an all-time record.



Oct. 11, 2016

ProCon.org and the historic Santa Monica Pier partnered to launch [PRO/CON @ The Pier – The Return of Civil Discourse](#) - a nonpartisan discussion series with prominent policy experts and celebrity moderators designed to better inform public discourse on ballot measures and current issues before Election Day. This 4-week series attracted hundreds of attendees and thousands who viewed the debates online.



Sep. 29, 2016

[Kamy Akhavan](#) became the new CEO of ProCon.org.



Sep. 22, 2016

ProCon.org jointly presented an expert panel discussion on immigration and college affordability titled "[Issues Facing Millennials: Listen, Talk, and #JustVote.](#)" It took place on Sep. 22, 2016 at the University of Southern California (USC), and was coordinated in conjunction with our partners: the Jesse M. Unruh Institute of

Politics at USC, Participant Media, TakePart, USC College Democrats, USC College Republicans, and *USA Today* College.



Aug. 16, 2016

We made a [new resource for Advanced Placement teachers](#) that ties our content to their coursework by subject. We created this resource at the request of the Talented and Gifted (TAG) magnet school in Dallas, which has been the #1 ranked high school in American for several years according to US News & World Report. The AP materials were presented in person and online to the TAG teachers and to several teachers from the #4 ranked high school in America (Science and Engineering Magnet, also in Dallas). The program was funded by an anonymous Texas donor.



July 14, 2016

On July 14, 2016, [ProCon.org held its first ever VIP salon](#) at the home of Ms. Janet Baszile in Palos Verdes Estates, CA. It was wonderful to connect with so many past, present, and future ProCon.org supporters. We thank Ms. Baszile and the many salon attendees, particularly for their inspired words about our organization's important work. We are grateful that these salon connections will lead to ongoing discussions and actions that forward ProCon.org and help spread our desperately needed public services to millions more people.



May 16, 2016

ProCon.org was declared a Top-Rated Nonprofit by Great Nonprofits for the 6th year in a row.

**May 9, 2016**

ProCon.org conducted a 10-week adult learning course about controversial issues using our pro and con research. The class of 18 seniors met weekly to discuss issues in a structured format. The participants loved the class and the PLATO organization expressed interest in holding the class again.

**Apr. 5, 2016**

Guidestar awarded ProCon.org its highest level of recognition, Platinum, for our "commitment to transparency." Guidestar is the nation's largest charity evaluation organization.

**Apr. 2016**

The California Campaign for the Civic Mission of Schools (an organization for which we serve on the Steering Committee), made ProCon.org a member of the Advisory Committee to the Los Angeles County Civic Learning Partnership, along with the other partner organizations of the Youth Civic Engagement Collaborative. The Advisory Committee is one of a network of six pilot civic learning partnerships under the auspices of the Power of Democracy Steering Committee, established by California Chief Justice Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye.
