Using the Internet:

When using the internet for the **content** of your speech, you need to evaluate the website before using the information you find:

Who wrote this information? Is the author an authority in this subject?

Where did the author get his/her facts?

Is this information trustworthy/biased/verifiable/current?

If the answer to any of these questions is 'no' or 'I don't know' don't use the information. You can find current/credible/unbiased research in any of the hundreds of databases the library subscribes to or any of the thousands of books we own. If you use the internet to find content for your speech, do so only when the topic is narrow or hard to find, and after you have searched databases or the catalog. Ask librarians for help if you can't find information. Research is a little like a scavenger hunt, you have to look around before you find your sources.
